221 Balliol Street Hallway Renovation


We are excited to share that the interior building renovations are

nearing completion. To date, the following improvements have been completed: replacement of floor and wall tiles from the Basement to Floor 18 (excluding Floor 1 lobby), replacement of corridor carpets, painting/ wallpaper replacement, garbage chute room painting and tile replacement, stairwell painting, replacement of fire exit signs and repair/restoration of terrazzo flooring.

235 Balliol Street Construction

Construction of 265 Balliol Street's temporary access road, accommodating resident pick-up and drop-off, is now complete. As you have noticed, construction of 235 Balliol Street has commenced of which when completed, will increase the greatly needed rental housing stock.

Please note that the construction of 235 Balliol Street is expected to take roughly three years to complete. It should be noted that construction activities will adhere to all mandatory by-laws as established by the City of Toronto.



ADVISORY ON PHARAOH ANTS

What Are Pharaoh Ants and how do we get rid of them?



Pharaoh ants are notorious indoor pests, often unnoticed due to their small size and colour. Workers are yellow to light brown, 1.5- 2 mm long while queen pharaoh ants are about 4 mm, reddish in color and feature enlarged abdomens. We have been advised that several units are experiencing an issue with these pests. We have engaged a Pest Control company to conduct a full building treatment which will take several visits over a month or so. We encourage you to advise us if your unit is affected so that we can effectively manage the situation.

Our Pest Control provider also offers our residents the following advice:

Preventative Measures to prevent pharaoh ants

- Clean your home thoroughly; don't ignore any corners and always keep it clean,
- Carefully manage waste. Don't let them hang around,
- Get all the food out of your pantry. Then clean it up. Finally, store your food in refrigerators or in tightly sealed containers,
- Rinse all food wrappers before sending them to the trash,
- Place sticky barriers around table legs, on plant supports, etc. You will then prevent the ants from climbing,
- Wash your bathrooms in case you find a few,
- Avoid leaving foods, cans, plates already used in the open air,
- Advise property management of any water leaks,
- Check any object or furniture before you bring it into your home.
